"Play Me a Story" Bringing Books to Life with Body, Voice, and Imagination! Michael Thomas & Julianne Shea, Portland Stage



The COVID pandemic has changed how our early learners interact with others and their environment. Learn in this workshop how the Lewiston Public Library partnered with Maine Roads to Quality, the Professional Development Network for childcare providers in Androscoggin County, to create social-emotional kits. These kits circulate between pre-school classrooms providing interactive hands-on materials and activities teachers can use in adaptable ways with their students to help them better understand their own feelings and behaviors of others. The kits have successfully been to 8 classrooms serving 89 children with fantastic feedback.

# Conducting a Diversity Audit in Your Library Cathy Potter, Falmouth schools




Book Challenges in Maine Schools: Panel Discussion with MASL School Librarians
